Presentation of the Business Impact Statement for the Proposed Environmental Health Fee Schedule Changes

I. BACKGROUND:

The Health District is responsible for state mandated environmental health permitting and inspections for Clark County, Nevada. Some examples of Health District environmental health permits include permanent and temporary food operations; pools and spas; public accommodations; schools and other institutions; childcare facilities; body art; underground storage tanks; permitted waste disposal facilities; individual sewage disposal systems; and liquid waste haulers.

The Environmental Health (EH) division of the Health District has not had an overall fee increase approved by the Board of Health for permits since June 25, 2009. At that time, the fees were calculated based on the total expenditures of the EH division and the hourly rate was determined to be \$118 which no longer sustains business operations.

II. SUMMARY:

After Health District staff had several meetings with the EH Fee Committee, the Board of Health recommended that staff charge appropriate fees for services. The Health District proposes the following EH Fee Schedule changes effective November 1, 2019:

 Decrease the Pool Operator/Technician fee to \$20.00 for new cards and \$15.00 for renewals and rename the category "Qualified Operator" to comply with the 2018 Aquatic Facility Regulations

- Increase the hourly rate to \$143.00. (Impacts hourly based research projects such as Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point reviews and waiver reviews)
- 3. New fee of \$400.00 for B Downgrades with 14-17 demerits
- 4. New fee of \$600.00 for B Downgrades with 18-20 demerits
- 5. Increase in the C Downgrade fee to \$1,200.00
- 6. Increase in the Food Establishment Closure fee to \$1,400.00
- 7. New fee of \$715.00 for Contingency Plan Reviews conducted by Food Operations
- 8. New fee of \$715.00 for Consolidated Grade Card Approvals
- 9. New hourly fee of \$143.00 for Solid Waste Annual Report Reviews
- 10. New fee of \$20.00 per person for Low-Risk Food Handler Training
- 11. New fee of \$389.00 for Secondary Permits (Plan Review fee for food establishments operating in another permitted food facility)
- 12. New permit fee of \$239.00 annually for Juvenile/Penal Institutions
- 13. New fee of 200% of the permit fee for expedited inspection requests (subject to staff availability)
- 14. New fee of \$143.00 per hour for cost recovery on Disease Investigations
- 15. Administrative cleanup which includes removing unused categories and assigning existing fees to correct categories

SNHD has concluded that approval of the proposed Fee Schedule changes is not likely to impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a large number of businesses or directly restrict the formation, operation, or expansion of a large number of businesses. Downgrade and closure inspections makeup approximately 8-10% of all Food Operational inspections. Most other fees are for optional services performed at the request of the operator.

III. <u>RECOMMENDATION</u>:

SNHD recommends approval of the Business Impact Statement for the proposed Environmental Health Fee Schedule changes. With recommendation, staff will move forward with the presentation of the proposed EH Fee Schedule changes at the October Board of Health meeting.

BUSINESS IMPACT STATEMENT ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES

Board of Health Presentation on September 26, 2019

The Southern Nevada Health District (Health District) staff will present before the District Board of Health (BOH) a petition to adopt proposed changes to the Environmental Health Fee Schedule. This Business Impact Statement serves as an analysis of the fiscal impact the proposed changes will have on businesses.

Pursuant to Nevada Revised Statues (NRS) 237, the following information has been prepared and is available at 280 South Decatur Boulevard, Las Vegas, Nevada or a copy may be obtained online at: www.southernnevadahealthdistrict.org.

ISSUES AND FACTORS TO BE CONSIDERED

The Health District is responsible for state mandated environmental health permitting and inspections for Clark County, Nevada. Some examples of Health District environmental health permits include permanent and temporary food operations; pools and spas; public accommodations; schools and other institutions; childcare facilities; body art; underground storage tanks; permitted waste disposal facilities; individual sewage disposal systems; and liquid waste haulers.

The Environmental Health (EH) division of the Health District has not had an overall fee increase approved by the BOH for permits since June 25, 2009. At that time, the fees were calculated based on the total expenditures of the EH division and the hourly rate was determined to be \$118, which no longer sustains business operations.

METHODOLOGY FOR THE PROPOSED FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES

Health District staff had five meetings with the EH Fee Committee to discuss fee increases. The EH Fee Committee was comprised of six Industry representatives and three BOH members, all appointed by the BOH. Committee and staff recommendations were presented to the BOH on June 27, 2019.

The BOH recommended that the fee schedule be adjusted in two phases. Phase One will

include adding or modifying the specific fees listed below, recategorizing existing fees, and removing obsolete fees. This is expected to better reflect cost recovery of services provided within each program. New fees requested are for services provided which do not currently have a fee associated with them.

Phase Two will come at a later date and include the adjustment of program fees to pay for the services provided and the addition of critically needed staff to handle community demands and growth.

PROPOSED FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES

The Health District proposes the following EH Fee Schedule changes effective November 1, 2019:

- Decrease the Pool Operator/Technician fee to \$20.00 for new cards and \$15.00 for renewals and rename the category "Qualified Operator" to comply with the 2018 Aquatic Facility Regulations
- 2. Increase the hourly rate to \$143.00. (Impacts hourly based research projects such as Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point reviews and waiver reviews)
- 3. New fee of \$400.00 for B Downgrades with 14-17 demerits
- 4. New fee of \$600.00 for B Downgrades with 18-20 demerits
- 5. Increase in the C Downgrade fee to \$1,200.00
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- 7. New fee of \$715.00 for Contingency Plan Reviews conducted by Food Operations
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- 11. New fee of \$389.00 for Secondary Permits (Plan Review fee for food establishments operating in another permitted food facility)
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- 13. New fee of 200% of the permit fee for expedited inspection requests (subject to staff availability)
- 14. New fee of \$143.00 per hour for cost recovery on Disease Investigations
- 15. Administrative cleanup which includes removing unused categories and assigning existing fees to correct categories

THE MANNER IN WHICH COMMENT WAS SOLICITED:

1. SNHD held five public meetings with the Environmental Health Fee Committee which is comprised of Board of Health members and Industry representatives. Meetings were held on March 25, 2019; April 5, 2019; May 7, 2019; May 29, 2019; and June 11, 2019.

Notifications of the meetings were duly posted on the SNHD (SNHD.info) and State of Nevada Public Notice (notice.nv.gov) websites, in the SNHD main office located at 280 S. Decatur Blvd., Las Vegas, Nevada, and in the main government centers and city halls of local municipalities (Clark County, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City, Mesquite, and Laughlin).

2. SNHD held public workshops to solicit input from affected businesses regarding the proposed EH Fee Schedule changes.

The public notice for the workshops, as well as, other methods to review the proposed changes, were duly posted on the SNHD (SNHD.info) and State of Nevada Public Notice (notice.nv.gov) websites, in the SNHD main office located at 280 S. Decatur Blvd., Las Vegas, Nevada, and in the main government centers and city halls of local municipalities (Clark County, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City, Mesquite, and Laughlin).

This public notice provided the date and time of the Public Workshops and Public Hearings, as well as, additional means to provide comment for those who could not attend Public Workshops.

- 3. The public notice was printed in the Las Vegas Review Journal, El Tiempo, Mesquite Local News, and Laughlin Nevada Times newspapers.
- 4. The public notice was mailed or emailed to the following associations: Las Vegas Metro Chamber of Commerce, Clark County Nevada Chamber of Commerce, Women's Chamber of Commerce, Henderson Chamber of Commerce, Asian Chamber of Commerce, Latin Chamber of Commerce, Boulder City Chamber of Commerce, Mesquite Chamber of Commerce, Nevada Restaurant Association, and the Resort Association.
- 5. The public notice link was emailed to individuals that have previously expressed interest in Environmental Health Fee Schedule changes.
- 6. SNHD staff met with representatives from the Las Vegas Metro Chamber of Commerce and the Retail Association of Nevada on August 29, 2019.

PUBLIC WORKSHOPS WERE HELD ON THE FOLLOWING DATES:

- 1. August 14, 2019, Wednesday, 10:30 a.m., Laughlin Regional Government Center, 101 Civic Way, Laughlin, in Rooms 1 and 2.
- 2. August 15, 2019, Thursday, 10:00 a.m., Mesquite City Hall, 10 East Mesquite Boulevard, Mesquite, in Training Rooms A and B (Upstairs).

- 3. August 21, 2019, Wednesday, 5:00 p.m., SNHD Public Health Center, 280 South Decatur Boulevard, Las Vegas, in the Red Rock Conference Room.
- 4. August 23, 2019, Friday, 9:00 a.m., SNHD Public Health Center, 280 South Decatur Boulevard, Las Vegas, in the Red Rock Conference Room.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS, DATA, OR VIEWS RECEIVED:

During the comment period ending on August 30, 2019, the Health District received 13 responses, which are in Attachment C. Some responders preferred an overall increase to annual permit fees rather than increased fees for downgrades and closures. Most responders did not want fees charged for B Downgrades due to the economic burden and bad publicity for their businesses. Many were also concerned about incentivizing inspectors to give downgrades. Some responders approved of an increase in C Downgrades and Closure fees.

ESTIMATED ECONOMIC EFFECT ON BUSINESSES:

1. Adverse Effects:

 Businesses utilizing services that are assigned new or increased fees will pay more for services provided.

2. Beneficial Effects:

- Pool Operators and Technicians will pay less for Qualified Operator cards.
- Low-Risk Food Handler training will provide job training to disadvantaged members of the community.

3. Direct Effects:

• Businesses will have to pay for services provided.

4. Indirect Effects:

- Businesses can reduce costs by doing their own research prior to submitting Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point and waiver review plans to the Health District.
- Businesses may improve food safety and sanitation to avoid paying higher fees associated with downgrades and closures.

DESCRIPTION OF THE METHODS CONSIDERED TO REDUCE THE IMPACT ON BUSINESSES AND A STATEMENT REGARDING WHETHER THE HEALTH DISTRICT USED ANY OF THE METHODS:

The initial EH Fee Schedule change recommendation was to increase all EH fees by 19.6% to eliminate the budget shortfall and allow for the immediate hiring of critically needed

staff. At the recommendation of the EH Fee Committee members, the BOH directed staff to charge appropriately for services provided. Rather than an overall fee increase, the BOH recommended that program fees pay for program costs once justified by a time study.

ESTIMATED COST TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROPOSED FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES:

The proposed Fee Schedule changes will not create a material administrative investment to enforce.

ESTIMATED REVENUES EXPECTED TO BE GENERATED BY THE PROPOSED CHANGES AND THE WAY THE FUNDS ARE TO BE USED:

The proposed changes are projected to increase Health District revenue by a minimum of \$1,276,000 annually. Funds will be used to reduce the budget shortfall in Environmental Health.


Renewal Every 2 Years \$85

Dear Dr. Iser:

In accordance with NRS 237.080 and 237.090, this letter serves as our submission of comments on behalf of Southern Nevada's resort industry in regard to the economic ramifications of the Southern Nevada Health District's (SNHD) proposed environmental health fee schedule changes.

As you know, the Nevada Resort Association represents gaming resorts across Clark County, all of whom will be affected by the proposed environmental health fee change given the variety of operations resorts encompass within their properties from food establishments to aquatic areas and more.

It is critical to note from the start, that our industry stands with the SNHD in its deep commitment to ensuring a healthy and safe environment for our residents and visitors through effective monitoring and regulation. Each of our members takes very seriously its obligation to maintain clean and safe operations for the community's overall public health. More than a business imperative, safeguarding the well-being of our employees and guests is embedded in the very foundation of our values and beliefs as responsible corporate citizens, and we recognize and appreciate the role the SNHD plays in assisting us in this area.

As your partners in public health, we believe your agency must be financially sound in order to best serve the community, and we understand budget augmentation through fee increases is sometimes necessary to maintain the financial stability of the SNHD as our community grows. As businesses, we also recognize that changes to fee schedules must be carefully evaluated through a thorough analysis of current and future operations and weighed against a variety of alternative measures capable of producing equivalent results.

Based on our members' careful review of the proposed environmental health fee schedule changes dated July 18, 2019, and their attendance at the August public workshops on the matter, the Nevada Resort Association respectfully requests that more time be allocated to the public process to allow for additional dialogue with the SNHD as well as a rigorous analysis of current data. This would ensure greater transparency and accuracy and better allow the public and all affected industries to fully understand this proposal, evaluate its impacts and further collaborate with you on solutions. This request is based on the following factors.

First, we have concerns with the overall public process. Through the course of this proposal, differing financial information on the SNHD's operations has been shared with the public with much of it based on unaudited figures and/or outdated information. Given that the SNHD's FY18 comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR) is imminent, we believe having the most current, consistent data to review and evaluate would be prudent to the discussion at hand and invaluable to ensuring accurate projections. With the actual results from the close of the fiscal year only a few weeks from being available, we request the use of actual data, as opposed to estimated values to make such an important decision.

In addition, there were a variety of fees outlined in the July notice that had not been publicly discussed during the Environmental Health Fee Committee meetings. The draft fee schedule comparison chart contains items such as "low-risk food handler training," "secondary permits" and multiple batched references to "reinspection fee" and "compliance survey," to highlight just a few. These appear to be new fees not previously publicly disclosed and were launched without written definitions or explanation making it challenging to determine their impact to our members' businesses and whether they are new, replace, or are in conjunction with other fees. Without details, evaluating the operational impact of these items was not possible by our members. Allocating more time to the process would allow the SNHD to provide clarity and insight into these additional fees and give our members and other businesses the ability to assess their financial impact.

Our request for an extended timeline is also based on our desire to participate in a working session with SNHD staff. Our members appreciate a collaborative approach similar to the process recently followed in the revision of the aquatics facilities regulations. We believe this interactive approach with open dialogue and the ability to ask questions is critical to understanding the basis behind certain fees and their application. While the August public workshops were appreciated, we believe the need for a more robust dialogue remains.

Of the fees where detail was provided, our greatest concern is the proposal to charge new reinspection fees on B downgrades. At the core of our concern is that this would base the agency's Environmental Health Division budget on an unpredictable revenue stream that unfortunately incentivizes an inspector to make a financial decision over a practical one. Under the proposed system, fees would be imposed for B downgrades due to 14-17 demerits at \$400 and at \$600 for B downgrades due to 18-20 demerits. As a practical matter, the road to 14 demerits, as you know, is a short one even for establishments operating at superior levels. Many of the issues that result in these B demerits are not of immediate or substantial risk to the public's health and can be quickly mitigated. In addition, it does not seem judicious to base revenue projections on B downgrade fees given their inconsistency year over year. This could have the unintended consequence of inspectors unfairly feeling as if they are responsible to shore up declining revenue streams by issuing more demerits than warranted. In other words, the SNHD would be budgeting for failure over success. For the record, we completely support enacting punitive financial measures against those establishments falling into the C category as well as for closures as these types of demerits do pose a substantial risk to the public.

Finally, the SNHD has selected November 1, 2019, as the implementation date for the new fee schedule. If this proposal continues on the current schedule, the Southern Nevada Board of Health would likely consider and possibly approve the new fees at its October 24th meeting, giving our members seven days to learn, train and communicate the new schedule to their teams. With such a short timeframe, a successful launch and implementation would be challenging – at best – for operators. If new fees are approved, we request adequate time to implement with additional consideration to initiating a new fee schedule at the start of a quarterly cycle, as is common practice with governmental agencies.

We appreciate your consideration of our perspective. We are available to discuss this matter further or provide additional information. Thank you for your time and your service to our community.

Re: Important changes to NRS 237.090 and business impact statements

Dear Dr. Iser:

At the conclusion of the 2019 Legislative Session, 635 bills were adopted which either modified or created new laws for Nevadans. The Las Vegas Metro Chamber of Commerce (Metro Chamber) wanted to bring to your attention one specific bill, which was passed by the legislature and signed into law by Governor Steve Sisolak.

Assembly Bill 413 provides greater clarity to the requirement by local governments to conduct an impact statement before implementing any rule which may impact businesses.

The definition of local government now encompasses health districts and requires them to follow the business impact statement process as directed by Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS). Additionally, the business impact statement must be considered in a public meeting and posted ten calendar days before the public meeting in which any proposed rule is adopted.

Included in the impact statement per the NRS 237.090 must be: a solicited summary of comments from businesses which will be affected by the rule, and an explanation of how others may obtain the summary aforementioned; an estimated economic effect on businesses regulated by the rule which includes the adverse and beneficial effects, direct and indirect effects, and a description of methods used to reduce impact on businesses by the proposed rule; an estimated cost to the government for enforcement; if the new rule will create a new fee or will increase an existing fee, as well as how much the local government will collect annually from the fee, and how the sum will be used; an explanation if the rule is duplicative or more stringent than federal, state, or other local standards for the same activity; an explanation for the conclusions regarding the impact of the proposed rule on businesses. The statement must then be signed by the managing authority certifying its accuracy.



Lastly, it was included that the failure to adhere to the guidelines in NRS 237.030 to 237.150 will make the rule ineffective. Businesses can also now petition rules that were implemented without an impact statement.

We can be an important resource for you and the Southern Nevada Health District in implementing AB413. As the Health District develops new regulations and processes, please use us as a resource. We will distribute and solicit our member businesses affected by the proposals so that the Health District will get the needed information to comply with the changes to NRS 237.090

It is the Metro Chamber's mission to ensure a smooth process for our members, which is why it is important to make sure all parties concerned are informed on the changes to NRS 237.090. As the largest and broadest based business organization in Nevada, it is important that we continue to inform our members about legislative changes that may impact their businesses as well as maintain open communication with all interested parties and stakeholders.

Comments for Public Workshop - 2019 EH Fee Increases

Any amount of fee increase imposes a direct and significant economic burden upon a business. Especially those relevant to the food program because we are already significantly burdened economically with current health department fees. We are already 2-3 times higher in fees compared to counties directly surrounding us.

For example, comparing other counties to our regular restaurant on the Strip that has 9 permits (see attachment SNHD Fees-Regular Strip Restaurant). This restaurant is considered a high risk facility, basically a complicated high end restaurant with 200 employees and over 350 seats. Our cost is currently \$3,116 annually (attachment SNHD Fees-Regular Strip Restaurant). Remember we are one of the only counties, if not the only county, that splits restaurant permits. Below we looked at a couple fees to compare. We are pretty much double in fees to all the other counties because of the splitting of the permits. Also, we do have facilities in LA County and had a similar sized restaurant on Hollywood Blvd and LA county did 2 permits 1 for the kitchen and restaurant and 1 for the bar (see below). We are still double that in Las Vegas. LA and San Diego should have higher fees overall because it is more expensive to do business in these areas. For Las Vegas to have double the fees is a very big skew. Plan Review fees are similar where it looks like Las Vegas is cheaper until you take into account the splitting of the permits which then shoots our fees up to double in comparison to the other counties.

Maricopa County

\$1,020 – restaurant high risk more than 10 seats

LA County Permit Fees

\$1438 - restaurant high risk 151 seats or more (kitchen and restaurant permit)

\$319 - restaurant low risk 0-30 seats (bar permit)

=\$1,757

San Diego County

\$1,824 – facility permit with more than 101 employees

In addition, currently there is approximately 21,000 food permits existing in Clark County and in comparison to the amount of business licenses there are only approximately 5,000 for food facilities. This averages to approximately 4 permits per food facility providing further evidence that in Clark County food facilities are already overburdened with SNHD permit fees which causes an existing significant economic burden to a restaurant.

Taking the previous example of the Regular Strip Restaurant paying \$3,116 annually for permits and dividing it by the current rate of \$118 (fee per hour of inspector time), it would equal 26.4 hours per year of inspector time being paid for with that annual fee. Realistically we see an inspector for approximately 5 hours per year. If we include the drive time of the inspector then it would equal to 6 hours yearly. This is still leaving 20 hours of paid time that is unaccounted for by the food inspector to this restaurant.

This issue plays out repeatedly in over 50 of our clients including over 75 food facilities on the Strip, 3 major properties on the Strip, manufacturers off Strip, and small family owned facilities.

To now impose more fees on top of an already overburdened system of fees is not economically feasible or fair to food facilities.

Here are more comments and unanswered questions-

- 1. In the 03/21/19 EH Fee Presentation PowerPoint (presented in the 3/25/19 meeting) on slide 9 SNHD concentrated on the increase of other County Health Department fees by comparing Percentages without comparing actual fee costs as a justification for their purposed increase. We have made public comment repeatedly that SNHD attempted to use the surrounding Counties as a reason to increase SNHD fees without doing actual research (as listed above) on what the fees actually are. When doing the real research it is discovered that permitted facilities in Clark County are already 2-3 times higher in permit fees.
 - a. We request SNHD do a study comparing Clark County fees to other surrounding agency fees. Especially because SNHD on 03/25/19 attempted to use this as justification for a fee increase.
- 2. In the 04/05/19 EH committee meeting the budget presented was the Attachment 2 EH Budget. This is the approved BOH budget for FY19. The line item labeled "Food" shows in FY18-20 that EH food is in the Black or making a profit however SNHD has decided to concentrate on increases that hit the Food Permit holders the worst. After this is pointed out in the EH committee meeting, in the following meetings SNHD presented changed budgets showing EH Food in the Red or losing money, attempting to justify fee increases heavy on Food Permit holders (see 2-Revenue Expense attachment 05/07/19 meeting). One way they did this was to put items from the training program into the food program as an expenditure. The training program is separate from EH Food Operations and does things other than food inspections. Training is done for all departments of EH and they also do inspections that are not food based. It is not accurate to lump in the Training of EH into food operations as it is showing EH Food in the red which is what SNHD is using as a justification to increase fees on EH Food.
 - a. With all of these changes to the official BOH approved budget provided initially on 04/05/19 EH committee meeting, we ask for no fee increases that would pose and additional significant burden. Especially to Food Permit holders because there is no confidence that SNHD has provided any correct accounting of the EH department budget to show the need for an increase in fees.
 - b. We request a correct line item budget for all EH departments prior to a fee increase.
- 3. The final number present at the Public Workshop on August 21, 2019 titled Notification of Proposed Environmental Health Fee Schedule Changes show a net loss of \$1,627,186 in FY19 for EH. When asked in the public workshop the Finance Manager said the final loss number would be ready in November 2019 after the vote at the BOH to increase fees to EH.
 - a. We have heard that the actual loss in EH in FY19 is \$700,000 not \$1.6 million.
 - We would like an accounting of what the actual loss for FY19 is prior to any fee increase.
- 4. Overhead for EH is being charged at a 28% rate. In the 05/07/19 EH Fee Schedule Presentation on slide 5-6 SNHD presents Cost Allocation or Overhead calculations. Again there is no line item

budget for any of these costs. When asked at the Public Workshops again the Finance Manager stated that the costs go to "supplies and salaries. Also, SNHD states that they conform with CFR 200 Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements For Federal Awards when calculating EH Overhead. Again when asked why EH, a permit fee driven department, was having overhead calculated based on federal grant awards the answer provided was a third party determines Overhead. When reading this CFR this seems to apply only to Grant applications when determining how much money to allocate to overhead when applying for a federal grant. It also states that the calculation cannot exceed the total amount, not that it can be lower. Additionally, SNHD has never explained why EH is charged almost 1/3rd of its budget to Overhead to fund the other divisions using a federal grant awards CFR. Additionally when applying for a federal grant it is assumed that no building, employees etc. have been hired yet to fulfill the grant parameters therefore overhead would be a larger number then for an established program like EH. This high level of overhead allocation, with the lack of line item budget showing what EH is paying for seems to be a loophole being used by SNHD to take money from EH, a permit driven division, in violation of the NRS 439.360 for the use of permit fees for general revenue.

County Board of Health and County Health Officer

NRS 439.360 County board of health: Powers. The county board of health may:

- 1. Abate nuisances in accordance with law.
- 2. Establish and maintain an isolation hospital or quarantine station when necessary for the isolation or quarantine of a person or a group of persons.
- 3. Restrain, quarantine and disinfect any person or group of persons sick with or exposed to any contagious or infectious disease that is dangerous to the public health.
- 4. Appoint quarantine officers when necessary to enforce a quarantine, shall provide whatever medicines, disinfectants and provisions which may be required, and shall arrange for the payment of all debts or charges so incurred from any funds available, but each patient shall, if the patient is able, pay for his or her food, medicine, clothes and medical attendance.
- 5. Subject to the prior review and approval of the board of county commissioners and except as otherwise provided in NRS 576.128, adopt a schedule of reasonable fees to be collected for issuing or renewing any health permit or license required to be obtained from the board pursuant to a law of this state or an ordinance adopted by any political subdivision of this state. Such fees must be for the sole purpose of defraying the costs and expenses of the procedures for issuing licenses and permits, and investigations related thereto, and not for the purposes of general revenue.

Additionally in the handout on 05/07/19 EH Fee Committee meeting labeled 6-New-Position-Costs it shows that all EH positions have a range of \$11,000-\$15,000 more in overhead if that employee has been at SNHD for a longer period of time. Even though the employees in the same job description sit in the same size desk and use the same amount of services. This has not been explained by SNHD.

Also we state that EH Overhead or Cost Allocation has stayed relatively at the same percentage even though SNHD purchased the building they reside in. There are no Rent or Mortgage payments on the building (usually the highest price in overhead) yet EH is still paying 28% overhead.

Another issue in the finance calculation is:

- 04/05/19 EH committee meeting the budget presented Attachment 2 EH Budget (approved budget by BOH FY19) shows the Administration expenditures at \$1,118,760
- 05/07/19 EH committee meeting the budget presented 2-Revenue Expense the Administration line item in FY19 as \$1,507,715 in expenditure.
- 05/07/19 EH committee meeting the budget presented for Cost Allocation for Administration in the EH Fee Schedule Presentation PowerPoint slide 6 is \$654,949.
- This seems to say that in addition to the 1.5 million in Administration cost there is now an additional \$650K going to Administration in Overhead.
- a. We state that if SNHD wants EH to be self-sufficient that a full line item accounting be shown to the permit holders and business owners for EH. It is not fair that SNHD is using a small amount of business owners that hold EH permits to pay for SNHD overhead, etc.
- b. We would like a full accounting on how overhead is calculated and why it is calculated at such a high percentage.
- c. We would like a full explanation of why EH is forced to use a CFR about Federal Grants.
- d. We would like a full explanation on why EH employees have different rates of Overhead assigned to them when they use the same equipment and desk space.
- e. We request no fee raises until this is explained.
- 5. Because of all the Financial Disclosure issues in the 05/19/2019 fee committee meeting SNHD now focused on increasing downgrade fees only for food facilities. Again, in the beginning of these meetings EH Food was in the Black and now, due to lumping in the Training department that does not do regular Food Inspections as their activities SNHD is showing EH Food is in the Red. SNHD falsified the amount of time that it takes for EH inspectors to do downgrades. They did this by included the first inspection and the second reinspection in the time calculation (20190519 EH Fee Schedule Presentation PowerPoint slide 8). The first inspection of a facility is what the Annual Permit fee covers. Using the example of our Regular Strip restaurant fees of \$3116, this restaurant is covering 26 hours of inspector time per year. It only receives the 5-6 hours per year of inspector time. SNHD states on Slide 8 a reinspection of a B grade takes 4 hours when in fact it takes half the amount due to the first inspection covered by the Annual Permit fee. We stated this in multiple public comments and SNHD ignored or lied about the amount of time it takes for reinspection. Then in the Public Workshop in August we were told by SNHD that these increases in downgrade fees were actually paying for future inspections of the restaurant not the current reinspection.

Also, it is very easy to get a B grade in Clark County because SNHD does not inspect based on trends and many downgrades are issued subjectively. Any restaurant can very easily get a B grade.

- a. SNHD now attempting to gather fees on a future inspection of a facility is illogical and excessive. First, if the downgrade happens close to the end of year then other permit fees kick in. Second, it is not guaranteed an inspector would have time or complete another inspection within a year therefore "future charging" is illogical and should not be allowed.
- b. Please provide accurate accounting of only the downgrade reinspection time.
- c. Due to anyone being able to get a B downgrade we do not support any fees for the B downgrade.
- d. Due to many restaurants already having a significantly higher fee than any other health department many restaurants are already paying for 4 or more inspections a year but only getting 1 inspection a year, therefore any increase for fees on restaurants should not be allowed and would be a financial burden.
- e. Increasing Downgrade Fees on restaurants to make up revenue losses by SNHD (that has still not been explained properly by SNHD) incentivizes inspectors to downgrade restaurants. This in turn gives bad publicity which hurt businesses.
- 6. In multiple meetings and in the Public Workshops SNHD stated and focused in on pools (which is showing in the black), schools, daycare, and solid waste as being the big drain on EH. This was even stated in the Public Workshops by SNHD. These fees being increased are causing Food Permit Holders to pay for other departments.
- 7. SNHD has repeatedly misled the public and the EH fee raise committee on "Mandates" of EH. The mandate is for 1 inspection to be performed by EH on each food facility in a calendar year. This is what is in the NRS and this is what the State Board of Health requires for their own health inspectors and SNHD. Everything else is an internal policy and subject to change. SNHD quoted the below NRS:

NRS states:

NRS 446.885 Inspection of food establishment.

- 1. At least once every year, the health authority shall inspect each food establishment located in the State.
- 2. The health authority shall make as many additional inspections and reinspections as are necessary for the enforcement of this chapter.
- 3. It is unlawful for any person to interfere with the health authority in the performance of his or her duties. (Added to NRS by 1963, 755; A 1969, 812)

NRS 446.885 #2 has never been used in the increasing of permit fees. SNHD now attempting to use this vague statement to say they need new Food Permit Fees to meet this mandate is untruthful and should not be allowed.

- a. We request the actual requirement that the State Health Department requires from their own inspectors and SNHD.
- 8. There has never been an explanation of Grants being written and performed by SNHD regular inspectors. No accounting has been provided on small grants and how they are written and performed and if the performance of these small grants are being coded to Timecards.

- a. We request an actual accounting of how much regular inspector time is being spent on writing small grants and performing small grants. We propose that inspectors are spending regular Permit Fees money on writing and performing small grants instead of performing inspections.
- b. We request documents listing grants, who writes them (and the coded timecards), the criteria in meeting the grant objectives, and the time and money spent performing the grant deliverables (with the coded timecards
- 9. No explanation has been given on the waste of money for the EH shift work. SNHD is bringing in \$600-800K per year in temporary permit fees which was paying for the \$100K per year OT provided to the inspectors for inspecting the afterhours temporary permit fees. Now 5 inspectors have been hired to work a night and weekend shift to primarily cover these temporary fees. SNHD is stating they need more inspectors to do more inspections of regular annual permits however they are using 5 regular inspectors at a salary of \$450-500K to inspect primarily after hours temporary permits. This is time that could be spent doing normal work. Also, temporary fees are as high as they are to cover inspector OT. So SNHD is wasting \$450-500K in salaried regular inspector time to cover temporary permits and save \$100K in OT. This is a loss of salary of \$350-400K.
 - a. If SNHD has the ability to have a shift work for afterhours, restaurants should not have to pay large afterhours fees.
 - b. Remove the shift work and allow Temporary Permits to be inspected on OT. This now frees up 5 inspectors to do more inspections on annual permits which is what SNHD is stating EH needs.
- 10. SNHD is asking for an increase in hourly rate from \$118 to \$143. This fee can be applied freely to anything that SNHD determines they want to apply it too.
 - a. This is a 20% increase of the current hourly rate and can be applied to anything indiscriminately. We ask that SNHD specify what it will be applied to.
- 11. SNHD is asking for \$715 fee for Contingency plans only for Food Operations. Contingency plans can be required for a variety of items and inspectors can indiscriminately require them.
 - a. We do not agree with this fee as it would be a financial burden on the restaurants for being forthcoming and wanting to do the right thing.
- 12. SNHD is asking for a \$715 fee for Consolidated Grade Cards. This is an automated form that is emailed to a facility that has their A grade and permits listed. This already saves time as facilities with 20 permits (which can take an inspector 30 mins or more to fill out by hand) and saves money in not using cardstock. It does not take \$715 of time for this.
 - a. We do not agree with this fee as it is an additional financial burden to the restaurants for something that is already supposed to be covered under their annual permit fees and provided as an incorporated service from SNHD.
- 13. SNHD is asking for \$143 per hour for disease investigation. These parameters have changed based on internal policy of SNHD. Currently SNHD is sending out 2 inspectors to restaurants based on 1 member of the public saying they ate at the facility and got sick.
 - a. We do not agree to the 20% fee increase to the per hour rate. We only agree to the recovery if there is an actual confirmed outbreak in a facility.

- 14. SNHD has never disclosed the amount of money saved with vacant positions in EH.
 - a. We request the amount of money saved in vacant positions that is not being reported in the budget.
- 15. The public workshops were not in accordance with NRS 237.080. Agenda for the public workshops were limited to 5 minute public comments. There was no open discussions for the public to ask questions. When I stated this in the public comment at the public workshops, SNHD answered some of my questions in the 2nd public comment. SNHD presented a 15 minute presentation with no information and when attempted to answer questions in the second public comment could not answer most questions.
 - a. Public workshops need to be redone with correct format. More permit holders need to be notified.
- 16. SNHD has repeatedly stated that services have been hurt and stopped in areas. No information has been provided on what these are. In fact inspectors are carrying the lowest permit level ever.
 - a. Provide what services have stopped by EH inspectors.
- 17. SNHD has inspectors doing YouTube videos and paid for 20 inspectors to go to the NEHA conference in Tennessee last month.
 - a. Please provide salary and costs associated with Youtube videos and conferences.
 - b. Please explain why in the middle of saying EH is broke that 20 inspectors are paid to go to Tennessee.

In 2017 SNHD attempted to raise fees on EH food permit holders. They could not provide accurate accounting, records or finances to make a case for fee raises. SNHD was directed by BOH members to provide accurate accounting prior to the next attempt to ask for fee raises. It is 2019 and SNHD is in the same situation without accurate accounting, records or finances, to allow for a fee raise. The EH permitted community allows for fee increases if there is a need with accurate accounting, however no accurate information on finances has been provided. SNHD has lied, manipulated, and withheld information from the BOH, EH Fee Committee, and the public and should not be allowed to raise fees. The above list is just some of the information in why no fee increases should happen unless accurate information is provided and analyzed.

Also, in the beginning meetings, the EH Food Program was one of the only programs that was in the black. It wasn't until later meetings, due to the manipulation of the numbers by SNHD, that the food program became in the red. We believe this is because the Food program has the highest number of activities and is the biggest program in EH so therefore is the one for SNHD to go after to maximize any fees.

SNHD has answered no questions on finances to the public or the EH fee committee. The tone by SNHD, in our opinion, is to provide as little information or confusing information and just get any fee increase approved by the BOH with crossing their fingers. Also, for every private business there is a responsibility to owners, boards, and investors, to provide basic finances. Including line item budgets, profit/loss statements, explanations of overheads, etc. If private businesses that hold EH permit fees are required to do this, then SNHD must provide these documents to the public they serve. Like in 2017, we request no fee raises until SNHD can provide accurate information.

As provided above EH permit holders are already facing a significant burden with their fees in relation to other counties. Therefore additional fee increase without merit would add unnecessary financial stress on permit holders. Also, Las Vegas is still one of the only cities in America that has not fully recovered from the financial crash of 2008. With incorrect and incomplete information provided by SNHD we cannot support any fee increases.

NOTIFICATION OF PROPOSED ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH (EH) FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES

July 18, 2019

INTRODUCTION

The Southern Nevada Health District (Health District) is responsible for state mandated environmental health permitting and inspections for Clark County, Nevada. Some examples of Health District environmental health permits include permanent and temporary food operations; pools and spas; public accommodations; schools; childcares; body art and tattoo; underground storage tanks; individual sewage disposal systems; and liquid waste haulers.

The Environmental Health (EH) division of the Health District has not had an overall fee increase approved by the Board of Health for permits since June 25, 2009. At that time, the fees were calculated based on the total expenditures of the EH division and the hourly rate was determined to be \$118 which no longer sustains business operations.

PROPOSED CHANGES

After Health District staff had several meetings with the EH Fee Committee, the Board of Health recommended that staff charge appropriate fees for services. The Health District proposes the following EH Fee Schedule changes effective November 1, 2019:

- Decrease the Pool Operator/Technician fee to \$20.00 for new cards and \$15.00 for renewals and rename the category "Qualified Operator" to comply with the 2018 Aquatic Facility Regulations
- 2. Increase the hourly rate to \$143.00. (Impacts hourly based research projects such as Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point reviews and waiver reviews)
- 3. New fee of \$400.00 for B Downgrades with 14-17 demerits
- 4. New fee of \$600.00 for B Downgrades with 18-20 demerits
- 5. Increase in the C Downgrade fee to \$1,200.00
- 6. Increase in the Food Establishment Closure fee to \$1,400.00
- 7. New fee of \$715.00 for Contingency Plan Reviews conducted by Food Operations
- 8. New fee of \$715.00 for Consolidated Grade Card Approvals
- 9. New hourly fee of \$143.00 for Solid Waste Annual Report Reviews
- 10. New fee of \$20.00 per person for Low-Risk Food Handler Training
- 11. New fee of \$389.00 for Secondary Permits (Plan Review fee for food processers with

permitted commissaries)

- 12. New permit fee of \$239.00 annually for Juvenile/Penal Institutions
- 13. New fee of 200% of the permit fee for expedited inspection requests (subject to staff availability)
- 14. New fee of \$143.00 per hour for cost recovery on Disease Investigations
- 15. Administrative cleanup which includes removing unused categories and assigning existing fees to correct categories

The proposed changes are projected to increase Health District revenue by a minimum of \$1,276,000 annually.

At that time, it is anticipated that the Board of Health will set a PUBLIC HEARING for October 24, 2019 to consider approval of the proposed EH Fee Schedule changes.

In accordance with NRS 237.080, business owners and interested parties may submit data and arguments to the Health District, in care of the EH division as to whether the proposed adjustments will:

- 1. Impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a business; or
- 2. Directly restrict the formation, operation, or expansion of a business.

Any comment submitted should be specific as to how and why a particular charge imposes such a burden.

<u>Questions/Comments – EH Fee Schedule Changes</u> <u>Board of Health Presentation on September 26, 2019</u>

Disease Investigations:

Internal SNHD policy has changed on disease investigations. Two inspectors are being sent to restaurants based on one member of the public saying that they got sick.

SNHD responds to a single case of illness only when the individual has a lab-confirmed diagnosis of a foodborne illness by a medical professional and that individual ate at a restaurant during the incubation period. There is a list of specific reportable illnesses that the Health Authority is required to investigate per Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS).

SNHD has used two inspectors on disease investigations since 2000. The assigned Food Operations inspector has knowledge of the facility's history and a relationship with the Person in Charge. The investigating inspector has the knowledge of the suspected outbreak, in depth knowledge of the pathogen and how it spreads, and the risk factors to be addressed.

How is EH going to determine who gets charged for disease investigations?

When ongoing transmission is identified or environmental sampling is required, SNHD may charge fees for investigative time and lab testing. The facility may not be charged when grant money is available.

Downgrades/Closures:

Downgrades are issued subjectively so it's very easy for facilities to get B Downgrades.

Violations are assigned according to Regulation standards.

B Downgrades are not an immediate or substantial risk to public health and can be quickly mitigated.

Any critical or major violation can have a significant impact on food safety.



It is not guaranteed that an inspector will have time to complete another inspection within a year after a downgrade; therefore, "future charging" should not be allowed.


Unannounced inspections on previous downgrades are prioritized over repeat annual routine inspections.

Why is the first inspection, that is paid for by the annual permit fee, included in the calculations for downgrades?

Downgrade inspections require additional time that is not expected under a routine A grade inspection. The facility, at a later time, will receive an additional unannounced routine inspection which is paid for by their annual permit fee.

Can SNHD provide accurate accounting of the downgrade reinspection time?

B Downgrade inspections take more time and require an additional inspection within one year.



Fees:

Why are new fees not previously discussed at the Environmental Health Fee Committee meetings being proposed? Can written definitions be provided?

Upon receipt of EH Fee Committee recommendations, the Board of Health (BOH) directed that fees should be charged for services provided. Proposed fee changes 2, 7, 8, 12, and 14 are fees for services provided. All other proposed fee changes were discussed at the EH Fee Committee meetings.



- 2. Increase the hourly rate to \$143.00. (Impacts hourly based research projects such as Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point reviews and waiver reviews)
- 7. New fee of \$715.00 for Contingency Plan Reviews conducted by Food Operations
- 8. New fee of \$715.00 for Consolidated Grade Card Approvals
- 12. New permit fee of \$239.00 annually for Juvenile and Penal Institutions
- 14. New fee of \$143.00 per hour for cost recovery on Disease Investigations

SNHD permits are already 2-3 times higher than other areas because we split permits.

Splitting permits is optional for a facility. SNHD will recommend splitting permits if areas are functionally or geographically separate.

Permit fees already pay for more inspector time than facilities receive.

Permit fees are based on average inspection times using 2009 dollars.

Are Food permit holders paying for other EH departments?

No because total Food Operations and related activities are operating at a deficit.

Item #2 of NRS 446.885 has never been used in the increase of permit fees.

2. The health authority shall make as many additional inspections and reinspections as are necessary for the enforcement of this chapter.

The BOH has directed Environmental Health (EH) to recover costs for services provided.

How will the \$143 hourly fee be applied?

The fee will be applied to hourly service charges for services such as, but not limited to, waiver and label reviews.



Why is Food Operations proposing a Contingency Plan fee when it can be required for a variety of items and inspectors can indiscriminately require them?

Contingency Plans are not required by SNHD and are done at the request of the operator. Facilities have the option of closing until the hazards are mitigated.

Why is a fee being charged for Consolidated Grade cards when that saves SNHD time and money since it is an automated form that is emailed to the facility?

The fee is only for the work associated with the initial intake. This is an optional service for facilities.

Why are the bulk of the fee changes in Food Operations, when staff are needed in Food and Pool Plan Review?

All programs need additional staffing. These proposed changes are intended to reduce the current budget shortfall but do not address staffing needs. The EH Fee Committee requested that additional information regarding timekeeping and services provided be collected over the course of the next year. The BOH requested that the EH Fee Committee's recommendation to change fees in Food Operations be presented at public workshops this year, so that additional fees might be collected prior to the completion of the timekeeping study.

Are we going to do a fee study with other counties to determine how much more Clark County charges for permits?

There are no current plans to do a fee study. Each jurisdiction has their own funding mechanisms, cost structures, and cost recovery.

Financials:

Why has the financial information shared with the public been different and based on unaudited and/or outdated information?

The EH Fee Committee has requested numerous variations of financial information all showing the same totals. The most current information was presented from historical and approved budget financial statements.



There was no deficit in Food Operations until the Training Program was also included. Why is the Training Program included with Food Operations since they do inspections that are not food based and training is done in all EH departments?

The vast majority of Training Office activities are related to Food Operations. In accordance with the direction of the BOH, staff are charging time for activities to the appropriate program.

A correct line item budget for all EH departments is requested prior to fee increases.

SNHD has provided numerous, detailed breakdowns of historical and budgeted costs to the EH Fee Committee as requested.

Where is the proof that EH is not self-sufficient?

Historic and current financials, as well as, the BOH Approved FY20 Budget

What money is being saved with vacant positions?

Any funds resulting from position vacancies are forecasted to apply to the specific program which contains the vacant position(s). The effect of any anticipated savings from vacancies are accurately reflected in the expenses comprising the BOH Approved FY20 Budget.

Does the \$1.7 million-dollar deficit include Vector Control?

Yes. The BOH directed that Vector Control program costs should be funded with general tax revenue starting in FY21.

Why is staff requesting fee raises when the actuals are not available yet?

The request for an increase in fees was to meet two goals: the first goal was to meet the shortfall identified in the BOH Approved FY20 Budget and the second goal was to meet the increased demands requested by Industry with additional staff.

Grants:

Can SNHD provide an explanation of grants being written and performed by



inspectors?

The minimal grant dollars received supplement ongoing Food Operations activities and community outreach.

Are grant activities being coded to timecards?

Yes, as grant expenses allocated by the grant budget.

How much regular inspector time is being spent on grants?

A small number of staff code a small number of hours against grants.

Miscellaneous:

Can SNHD provide the actual inspection requirements for SNHD?

The BOH adopted the Food Regulations Governing the Sanitation of Food Establishments and EH also has approved internal policies dictating inspection frequency based on FDA best practices and comparable resort jurisdictions.

NRS 446.885 Inspection of food establishment.

- 1. At least once every year, the health authority shall inspect each food establishment located in the State.
- 2. The health authority shall make as many additional inspections and reinspections as are necessary for the enforcement of this chapter.
- 3. It is unlawful for any person to interfere with the health authority in the performance of his or her duties.

 (Added to NRS by 1963, 755; A 1969, 812)

Why are public workshop comments limited to five minutes?

Five minutes is the traditional guideline recognized by SNHD for public comments and is compliant with NRS 241.020(2)(d)(7), as long as it's noticed on the agenda.



What areas can SNHD cut internally to help with the deficit?

EH has had the same funding structure for the last ten years. Staff have had to do more service with less funding. EH has reduced overtime, services, and expected inspection frequencies.

How have services been impacted?

Consumer Health: Lack of funding limits hiring. Additional staff are needed to adequately cover plan review demands imposed by increased construction activities. Additionally, the number of schools and body art facilities has increased by 15% since 2009. Because schools and body art facilities require two inspections per year, this equates to a 30% increase in the number of required routine inspections. The number of inspectors assigned to these facilities has remained at 5, which results in inadequate follow-up for non-compliant facilities.

Food Operations: This section has many value-added services that are included at no additional cost to the operator. While the majority of these services have not been interrupted, a lack of funding will impact these services moving forward. Most tangibly, our responses to illegal vending have been notably impacted, to the point that concerned citizens have complained directly to the BOH. Also, per our inspection frequency policy, there should have been approximately 26,460 inspection done in FY18, but Food Operations staff was only able to complete approximately 22,654 inspections.

Solid Waste: Illegal Dumping Program complaints have seen 15% and 25% increases for FY18 and FY19, in comparison to FY17. Manpower distribution has been affected, causing first-time shortfalls in mandated inspections for the Restricted Waste Management Program.

If Food Operations needs more staff, why are facilities being inspected 2-4 times a year and inspectors are saying they have completed their work for the year already.

As of August 30, 2019, Food Operations had 20.4% uninspected facilities, as well as, not keeping pace with our inspection frequency schedule.



Reinspections and follow-up unannounced inspections are frequently required for facilities with compliance issues.

If Food Operations needs more staff, why are 20 inspectors doing YouTube videos? Training videos provide the community with educational resources to promote food safety and lead to successful business practices. Additional training has been requested at Industry Partnership meetings.

If EH needs more staff and money, why were so many inspectors sent to the national conference?

EH paid for 1.5 people to attend the national conference. All other attendees were funded by scholarships, grant money, partial grant money, other agencies, or the employee. SNHD pays for travel and registration expenses for staff who are presenting at conferences. Conferences provide Continuing Education Units (CEUs) which are required for Registered Environmental Health Specialist (REHS) certification.

Is there an anonymous way we can collect Industry feedback? Feedback can be submitted anonymously via US mail.

Can EH recoup costs from complainants of invalid complaints?

EH does not have a mechanism to bill the general public and SNHD does not want to discourage reporting.

Can marijuana money be used to recoup costs?

At this time, marijuana sales are regulated by the State of Nevada and are not allocated to SNHD.

Overhead:

Is the high cost of overhead, with no line items to breakdown costs, a way to take money from EH to use as general revenue?

As we have illustrated to the EH Fee Committee, per Federal guidelines, the District employs an independent 3rd party audit agency to calculate an annual District-wide cost allocation rate. At the EH Fee Committee meetings,



we have reviewed the detailed results, applications, and methodologies used in this calculation.

Why is overhead so high when SNHD owns their main building?

SNHD has provided detailed information as to the elements and calculation of applied overhead. Overhead has been reduced annually since FY17.

Is an additional \$650K in overhead going to Administration, in addition to the \$1.5 million?

As illustrated to the EH Fee Committee, a Cost Allocation of approximately \$650K of the total District Administration costs are applied to EH.

Why is overhead calculated using 2CFR 200 when EH is a fee driven department, not grant driven?

Since before 2011, SNHD has consistently applied a district-wide methodology to recover reasonable overhead costs based in part on guidance provided by 2CFR 200. Like similar government health entities, SNHD manages multiple Federally funded projects which are guided by Federal regulations. The methodology as applied has been reviewed and audited by independent industry professionals and determined to be an appropriate approach to cost recovery.

Why does it cost more in overhead for an EHS II that's been employed ten years, than an EHS II that's been employed two years?

It's based on the assignment of a percentage of a person's salary.

What is the line item breakdown of overhead costs?

This information was provided to the EH Fee Committee meeting on May 7, 2019.

What is the breakdown of the \$1.3 million dollars in overhead going to IT? How much goes to salary?

The auditors do not provide a corresponding cost list which shows how EH's overhead allocation is distributed.

Swing Shift:

Why is EH using five Swing Shift inspectors to inspect temporary events when fees for these already include an allowance for \$100K in overtime?

SNHD is not aware of a \$100K allowance in overtime. More clarification is needed.

Shouldn't Swing Shift inspectors be doing regular inspection work?

Swing Shift inspectors are assigned regular work.

Why are facilities required to pay afterhours fees when there is a Swing Shift?

Afterhours work is considered to be additional services provided, not included in Swing Shift's standard work day.

Timing:

Can we have a four-week extension of time to make comments?

Leadership determined that an extension of time was not feasible with the current budget shortfall.

Can an extension of time be granted so fee changes can be based on actual numbers from the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) since that will



be available soon?

Leadership determined that an extension of time was not feasible with the current budget shortfall.

Can the Resort Association participate in a working session with SNHD staff for a more robust dialogue?

The Resort Association had an appointed member on the EH Fee Committee. EH is open to meeting with interested stakeholders.

An effective date of November 1, 2019, does not give Industry enough time to learn, train, and communicate the Fee Schedule changes to their teams. Can the effective date be changed to the start of a quarterly cycle?

There have been no Regulation changes that would require training. SNHD will communicate Fee Schedule changes once approved. Leadership has determined that an extension is not feasible with the current budget shortfall.

When are the questions and answers going to be brought back to the public?

Questions will be answered when the Business Impact Statement is published.

NOTIFICATION OF PROPOSED ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH (EH) FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES

INTRODUCTION

The Southern Nevada Health District (Health District) is responsible for state mandated environmental health permitting and inspections for Clark County, Nevada. Some examples of Health District environmental health permits include permanent and temporary food operations; pools and spas; public accommodations; schools; childcares; body art and tattoo; underground storage tanks; individual sewage disposal systems; and liquid waste haulers.

The Environmental Health (EH) division of the Health District has not had an overall fee increase approved by the Board of Health for permits since June 25, 2009. At that time, the fees were calculated based on the total expenditures of the EH division and the hourly rate was determined to be \$118 which no longer sustains business operations.

PROPOSED CHANGES

After Health District staff had several meetings with the EH Fee Committee, the Board of Health recommended that staff charge appropriate fees for services. The Health District proposes the following EH Fee Schedule changes effective November 1, 2019:

- Decrease the Pool Operator/Technician fee to \$20.00 for new cards and \$15.00 for renewals and rename the category "Qualified Operator" to comply with the 2018 Aquatic Facility Regulations
- 2. Increase the hourly rate to \$143.00. (Impacts hourly based research projects such as Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point reviews and waiver reviews)
- 3. New fee of \$400.00 for B Downgrades with 14-17 demerits
- 4. New fee of \$600.00 for B Downgrades with 18-20 demerits
- 5. Increase in the C Downgrade fee to \$1,200.00
- 6. Increase in the Food Establishment Closure fee to \$1,400.00
- 7. New fee of \$715.00 for Contingency Plan Reviews conducted by Food Operations
- 8. New fee of \$715.00 for Consolidated Grade Card Approvals
- 9. New hourly fee of \$143.00 for Solid Waste Annual Report Reviews
- 10. New fee of \$20.00 per person for Low-Risk Food Handler Training
- 11. New fee of \$389.00 for Secondary Permits (Plan Review fee for food processers with

permitted commissaries)

- 12. New permit fee of \$239.00 annually for Juvenile/Penal Institutions
- 13. New fee of 200% of the permit fee for expedited inspection requests (subject to staff availability)
- 14. New fee of \$143.00 per hour for cost recovery on Disease Investigations
- 15. Administrative cleanup which includes removing unused categories and assigning existing fees to correct categories

The proposed changes are projected to increase Health District revenue by a minimum of \$1,276,000 annually.



THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

July 26, 1912: Pioneer day was celebrated in this town (Washington UT) the towns of Bunkerville and Mesquite joining. At 9:30 there was a Pioneer Parade followed by all day entertainment

and ronowed by an day Christon and ending with a lively dance.

July 27, 1908, Bunkerville: Horace Jones and Will Macdonald of Overton were over to spend the 24th and it might be that they came to see the girls also, but if they didn't come to see the girls perhaps it was to play baseball or to see our country. At any rate they had a good time and were last seen

driving out of town wearing a sombrero belonging to one of the young ladies.

July 30, 1910: Edward I. Cox of Bunkerville was one of the prominent figures at the republican meeting Tuesday night. James S. Abbott, postmaster at Bunkerville, and one of the best-known residents of that section, assisted Tues-day evening with the republican mass meeting. Bishop Jos. I Earl left for Moapa Saturday with grapes from the grape farm to ship to Utah points. From Moapa he will go to Overton to visit his children, Mrs. W.L. Jones and some who are working there. Water was got into the ditch tonight and a few people have got it at their gardens.

July 31, 1909: Our people was greeted this morning with the booming of cannon. This is Pioneer Day. During the night we had beautiful rain, the second one this week and there was a freshness one this week and there was a freshness about the air that is really bracing. The third crop of alfalfa is most all up and the thrashers are busy separating the grain from straw, Jas. S Abbott sowed 2 1/4-acre plot to dry land wheat last fall and recently threshed his crop and it so happened that he threshed a better crop of wheat from his plot of ground (grown without water) than any other formers. without water) than any other farmer has done on ground irrigated. It was somewhat of a surprise to the farmers and it is likely that the same method will be followed by many next season.





Chris Saxton, Environmental Health Director, opened the workshop at 10:32 a.m. by welcoming all those in attendance. The purpose of the workshops is to collect public opinion on the proposed Fee Schedule changes, especially whether the proposed changes will:

- 1. Impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a business; or
- 2. Directly restrict the formation, operations, or expansion of a business.

Anyone wishing to ask questions or make comments, was instructed to use the microphone to clearly state their name and comments and to spell their last name for the record. Comments not made into the microphone, may not be audible and may not be included in the public record. Comments were limited to five (5) minutes. The first public comment period was for anyone wishing to comment on agenda items. The second public comment period was for anyone wishing to comment on any topics.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

No public comments.

PRESENTATION (ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES)

Chris Saxton presented the PowerPoint presentation for the proposed Fee Schedule changes. The Health District has not had a fee increase in ten (10) years so Environmental Health is no longer financially self-sufficient. Health District staff had initially proposed a flat rate increase in permit fees, but the Fee Committee and Board of Health members wanted targeted changes and for people to pay for the services used. One suggestion was to charge for some B Downgrades and increase C Downgrades and Closure fees.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS PERIOD

Dewayne Rose: My name is Dewayne Rose. I'm the Executive Chef at the Colorado Belle and Edgewater. Here you have a \$1,200, if you go to the C Grade column (inaudible). I would just like to understand why it is double from a B to a C. Whereas 21 points for a C Grade and it's double. I don't understand why. What caused it to double?

Larry Rogers: Ok, so the methodology. I'm sorry. I'm Larry Rogers. I'm the manager of Food Operations. So, when we went to the Fee Committee, we asked, of course, for the 19% raise. The Fee Committee was, their recommendation is that people that are incurring these costs pay for these costs, so they had me go back to take a look at how much time these downgrades costs. Our B Grades are running about \$500 of our time, our staff's time. C Grades are running about \$1,000 and Closures about \$1,200. The way the Fee Committee wanted to. Actually, I'm sorry, the way the Board of Health, when the Fee Committee made these recommendations, the Board of Health wanted us to add some punitive penalties to the downgrade costs, so Cs went from \$1,000 to \$1,200. The Closures went from \$1,200 to \$1,400 so it's \$200 above and beyond what it costs us to actually put the inspector in the field, handle all the office time, and do the reinspection and subsequent follow on inspection. They add \$200. For the B Grades, we are still breaking even on those, but they did split it up to where the lower tier B Grades would be \$400 so a \$100 break but then it would be paid for by the higher ones at \$600. So that's where those numbers came from.

Dewayne Rose: Ok.

Larry Rogers: Do you have any comment about that? Is it going to create a hardship for you?

Dewayne Rose: (Inaudible) It's not easy for operations to pay that much. And then, also if you look at consolidate or I'm sorry that I don't know the terms.

Larry Rogers: The consolidated grade card?

Dewayne Rose: It was shown in your information.

Larry Rogers: Do you have any consolidated grade cards?

Dewayne Rose: I don't have one.

Larry Rogers: Ok.

Dewayne Rose: but Mike might have some consolidated or not consolidated (inaudible). If we have, is the same fee for the consolidation if you wanted to add another grade?

Larry Rogers: Ok, so the consolidated grade card, once you have that, it doesn't cost us anything or any additional time for us to issue that out. It's the initial permit. It takes about five hours, so we get the request from the operator that wants the consolidated grade card. It's usually casinos, you know if you have multiple permits in a buffet or something like that. Instead of having 5,6,7 up to 15 permits on the wall, they want one. We have been offering that as a value added but again the direction from the Board was that services that we are giving to the community need to be paid for by the people that are asking for them, so it takes us a couple of hours to talk with the operator and find out what they want. Take the, you know take the request in and process the paperwork, have an inspector go out to the facility, a special trip, identify what permits are on that consolidated grade card and then come up with a location, post the grade card, and then take the picture to put it in the file so we have a record of where it is. Then we have to come back to the office and put that into our computer system. That takes about five hours. That's roughly \$715 dollars. So that's where that cost came from.

Dewayne Rose: Ok. Thank you.

Larry Rogers: Alright, thanks. So, do you have any recommendations? If you were trying to get 19% more, what would you do?

Dewayne Rose: If I tried to

Larry Rogers: I mean because we are running at a deficit right now. We have to make the money up somewhere and this conversation I'm having with you, is what we had with our Fee Committee, but you know, you are members of the public and I mean if you were to do it?

Dewayne Rose: If I was in your shoes and I was looking for more money, I would look at the services operations use to smooth, to run their operations smoothly such as having those come out working directly with learning individuals such as ServSafe classes. Those types of things. Whatever you can provide that you can give to someone, you can charge a fee for.

Larry Rogers: Sure.

Dewayne Rose: To help organize it. The Legal (inaudible) Food Operations with that combination of Ecolab.

Larry Rogers: Right.

Dewayne Rose: So, do what they're doing. I don't see a reason why the Health Department can't provide some of those services for a fee. That would help.

Larry Rogers: Ok, so look into maybe some revenue generating activities.

Dewayne Rose: I think there's a lot there that would certainly help operations. The list is endless if you look at it.

Larry Rogers: Ok.

Dewayne Rose: I mean (inaudible) awareness stickers. You name it and I think that can come from the Health Department for a fee.

Larry Rogers: I don't disagree with you. It didn't come up from the Fee Committee but that's I think a real good suggestion and we can take that back to the Board and see if they want to move on that.

Dewayne Rose: Alright.

Larry Rogers: Alright. Thank you.

Chris Saxton, Environmental Health Director, opened the workshop at 5:03 p.m. by welcoming all those in attendance. The purpose of the workshops is to collect public opinion on the proposed Fee Schedule changes, especially whether the proposed changes will:

- 1. Impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a business; or
- 2. Directly restrict the formation, operations, or expansion of a business.

This information will be presented at a public hearing at the Board of Health meeting on Thursday, September 26, 2019, at this same location.

Anyone wishing to ask questions or make comments, was instructed to use the microphone to clearly state their name and comments and to spell their last name for the record. Comments not made into the microphone, may not be audible and may not be included in the public record. Comments were limited to five (5) minutes. The first public comment period was for anyone wishing to comment on agenda items. The second public comment period was for anyone wishing to comment on any topics.

The following SNHD staff introduced themselves: Larry Rogers, Food Operations Manager; Herb Sequera, Solid Waste and Compliance Manager; Karla Shoup, Consumer Health Programs Manager; Robert Newton, Environmental Health Analyst; Ernest Blazzard, Financial Services Manager; and Healther Hanoff, Environmental Health Secretary.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Cara Evangelista: Hi, my name is Cara Evangelista. I'm from Impact Food Safety and Environmental Health. We represent over a thousand food permits which is 5% of all permitted food facilities in the city, including about 70 restaurants or food establishments or food areas on the Strip itself, manufacturing properties, fast casual facilities, mom and pops, and those kinds of areas. Pretty much anybody that's doing food. First, I would like to say that according to, in my opinion, which I think you know, according to NRS 237.080, in a public workshop, you're supposed to be able to present comments and questions of what's happening at the, what the topic is. Limiting to a five-minute public comment, already seems like that is not proper for a public workshop. Everything that I'm going to make a comment for today, it does represent an economic, all these fees represent an economic burden, especially to the small facilities that we represent and any comments or questions that I have is directly related to why do you need a fee raise and if you are going to do a fee raise, you have to justify a fee raise. So, I would like to first say that I'm not really sure why there are so many fees being proposed because in the June Board of Health, it looked to me like the Board of Health directed only an increase in downgrades and a B downgrades and expedite fees. Now there's multiple fees that I didn't see that the Board of Health approved that you move forward to public workshop. The one that is concerning to us is the \$143 per hour for an inspector's time because really that can be tacked onto anything and that's the 20% that the Board specifically told you not to raise, do a 20% fee increase but if you're raising a per hour rate, you could really put it on anything. I'd like to know when, if this is going directly to the Board, when are any of the questions going to be answered and brought back to the public. If we submit questions in writing, if we submit questions here and comments here, when does it come back to the public for an explanation if you are going directly to the Board for the approval of the raise? I would like, I would make comment that EH has not proven they are not selfsufficient. In multiple, I went to multiple of the meetings of the Environmental Health Fee Committee and in every meeting the finances changed according to the last meeting. Specifically,

in the first meeting, it showed that Food Operations was one of the only areas in EH that was turning a profit and then after that, all the sudden, EH Food seems to not be turning a profit and that most of these fees are aimed at EH Food which is restaurants and that was the one place where it seemed that they were, they are covering their expenses. I'd like to know how services have been impacted. We have one facility on the Strip that's been inspected four times already this year so if there is a lack of staff, how can an inspector be going to a facility four times? One of our Henderson properties is getting, got their second inspection last month and the inspector there told me that he was finished for the year and he was starting his second round of inspections. I've seen YouTube videos where inspectors, maybe 15 inspectors, are in YouTube videos. How are you doing YouTube videos? If there's no money, how did you just send 20 inspectors to Tennessee for 3 or 4 days for an EH conference? So, there's a lot of things where, you know, there's no money but then you look on YouTube and there's 15 inspectors doing a YouTube video.

Herb Sequera: You've had five minutes and your time is up.

Cara Evangelista: I guess I'll come back for the last public comment then and be cut off.

Chris Saxton: Ok, thank you for your comments. Anyone else?

William Wong: Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen. My name is William Wong. I represent the Asian Chamber. We have a Restaurant Coalition. We are opposed to the rate increase. Your rate increase ranges from 17% to 100%. How? I cannot figure out why is the rate double. We are also very concerned regarding the approach of the visit which consists of downgrade. We represent a lot of diversity restaurants, along with traditional fast food, and we are very concerned about this whole rate increase. We feel that there is still a lot of unanswered questions like the previous speaker is, so I just want to let you know that we are not very supportive. We are not supportive of the rate increase at this point. Thank you.

Chris Saxton: Alright. Thank you for your comment.

Tim Moulson: Hi. When I circulated the information to my clients, of which I have over a 100 here in town, 1/10 of hers, most of them were concerned about the raise increase. But more importantly, when I said that this is your opportunity to come down to discuss it, most of them were in fear of retaliation during their next inspection, albeit as much as I tried to convince them that wouldn't be the case. My questions was is there a better way, an anonymous way, to get the feedback from those clients? Like my previous speaker, most of mine are Asian, Mexican, ethnic restaurants so that's the only comment I have. Whether the fees are justified or not, I have not gone to the extent that the other speakers have gone to, to look at the impact. All I know is that they say with the increase of minimum wage and the increase of the Health Department fees, some of them will go out of business and it's that simple, but more importantly, we have to find a better

way to communicate with them. I don't know where they get this fear of retaliation but that's what they told me over and over and over again. Ok, thank you.

Chris Saxton: Thank you.

PRESENTATION (ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES)

Chris Saxton presented the PowerPoint presentation for the proposed Environmental Health Fee Schedule changes. The Health District has not had a fee increase in ten (10) years so Environmental Health is no longer financially self-sufficient. The Health District is looking for suggestions and comments regarding cost recovery. He encouraged attendees to give staff their solutions for cost recovery.

The Fee Committee and Board of Health members wanted people using services to pay for the services. One suggestion was to charge for some B Downgrades and increase C Downgrades and Closure fees. This includes a punitive amount. The numbers of these will probably go down with the financial incentive to do better. For consolidated grade cards, those that already have it, won't be paying the fee but there would be a \$715 fee for any new ones requested.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS PERIOD

Mark Carrillo: I represent Broadacres Marketplace. I am the Director of Food and Beverage there. I'm also the Corporate Director of Food and Beverage for Newport Diversified that owns Broadacres. Broadacres has approximately 1,100 independent vendors on property. Of those, over 100 are food vendors, peanut vendors, other hot food vendors. They are penny profit so if they do make a mistake and we know they do; these fees will impact them tremendously to the point where they may not even be able to reopen. Peanut vendors sell peanuts for \$2-\$5. That takes a lot if they get closed down for some crazy reason. \$1,400 is a lot of peanuts you know. I know Herb knows Broadacres. I know Karla knows Broadacres. They know exactly the kind of customers we deal with so I'm here, obviously, to oppose these new fees. Thank you.

Chris Saxton: Alright. Thank you.

Cara Evangelista: So, I still don't understand how this is a public workshop if this is over now and we are limited to five minutes. When the Pool Regulations changed, we had multiple public workshops where there were discussions and people had their questions answered. This is like a five minute and cut off. I'd just like to say that you had, you said yourself that where you needed people was Plan Review, Pools, and Food yet most of these, this financial burden is going to fall on Food Operations so why are you proposing increased fees in Food Operations when you just sat up here yourself and said that it was needed in Plan Review and Pools? That makes no sense. So, I would say that if you really need some Plan Review and Pool and Food, that's where you look at the fees.

Larry Rogers: So, did you want me to answer or do you want to

Cara Evangelista: Is that going to cut into my five minutes or?

Larry Rogers: We can. Yeah, we'll extend it of course. I mean it looks like we're going to have plenty of time. So, the dictate from the Board was that we're going to do the fee increase in two rounds. The first round is going to be to bring us up to where we're self-sufficient and then the second round, we're going to take a look at our time allocation, give the Fee Committee maybe a better idea of where we're spending our time with, you know, annual itinerants and ISDS, that sort of thing and then look at right sizing the fees per program. So, this round, the suggestion that the Fee Committee brought to the Board and the Board proposed was that we would do fee recovery through basically these downgrade fees so that's why Food Operations seems to be getting the brunt of this round of fee increases.

Cara Evangelista: So, you're going to take B downgrades fees now and put it towards Pool, hiring Pool people and Plan Review people?

Larry Rogers: It's going to be going towards the deficit that we have in Food Operations.

Cara Evangelista: But the, in the first meeting we had, there was no deficit in Food Operations.

Larry Rogers: That's if you look at Food Operations by itself but if then, when you put all the auxiliary services, the Training Office, the HACCP Plan, the Annual Itinerants, the Mobile Vendors, all that. You put that all together as all Food Operations, which it is, overall, we are in the red.

Cara Evangelista: I don't think that you've shown that in the public meetings with the Fee Committee.

Larry Rogers: You know I don't have that with me right now but I think we did but if I didn't then

Cara Evangelista: I mean I have. I have it and it changed every meeting we had. I mean I would also like to talk about how the B grades are based. The fee itself is based on a false number, that you've included the first inspection that's paid for by permit fees, by the annual permit fees, in that calculation. That \$580 that you say takes four hours to do a B grade reinspection. It does not take four hours. You are including the first inspection.

Larry Rogers: That's correct.

Cara Evangelista: which is paid for by the annual permit.

Larry Rogers: And you are right but if you get a B grade, you get a reinspection, but we have to go back within a calendar year which is an additional inspection that year.

Cara Evangelista: But it doesn't take four hours to do a reinspection of a B grade.

Larry Rogers: Altogether. I did a random sampling.

Cara Evangelista: It's not altogether. It's including the first inspection. Does that include the first inspection?

Larry Rogers: Yes.

Cara Evangelista: That inspection is paid for by the annual permit fee that people are paying.

Larry Rogers: But after you do the inspection, then whatever office work is involved with getting them off their B grade and then they go out and do the reinspection, travel time, all that included. Then, within the calendar year, I would have to do another inspection.

Cara Evangelista: That's a self-imposed mandate and an internal policy. That is not required by state law.

Larry Rogers: I would say the state law does say that because the state law

Cara Evangelista: The state law does not

Larry Rogers: says that I have to do as many inspections, Part B of that law. A is once a year. B says as many inspections as necessary to ensure compliance. If a place fails an inspection, I would say the law pretty much mandates that I go back.

Cara Evangelista: That is not what it says. If you do, you have to do one inspection of a permit of a food facility per year. That was, when I worked here, that was the mandate so the state, the NRS changed and now

Larry Rogers: The NRS has always said that and I would say if a place fails an inspection

Cara Evangelista: You're making internal

Larry Rogers: and I never went back to it, I would be liable.

Cara Evangelista: You're making internal policy to get a fee increase. You are basing a fee increase based on some internal policy that you guys wrote.

Larry Rogers: When I first started here and we started together, the internal policy is that every restaurant, every food facility got two inspections per year. I can't do that anymore.

Cara Evangelista: That wasn't. That's not the state law.

Larry Rogers: I understand that but that was the policy. We have not changed any policies. If anything, we're doing fewer inspections on facilities than we did ten years ago when we were working in 2009 dollars in 2009. Now I'm working in 2019.

Cara Evangelista: Actually, I'd like to make that comment. I would like to make a comment about that. In the first meeting that I attended, you attempted to compare our fees to LA County, San Diego County, Maricopa County, all these other counties and you said that. It was presented that we needed a fee increase here because they had fee increases; however, when you look at their fees, they had fee increases. We are still 3 and 4, 2 and 3 times higher than LA County, San Diego County, and Maricopa County. I presented this at the public comment at some of the last Fee Committee meetings and it was never answered, that question. So, are you guys going to be doing a comparison of how much the fees cost in LA County to us because we have done that comparison and I've presented this before. Our regular restaurant on the Strip, a regular restaurant, costs \$3,100 per year in annual fees. That's like 25 hours of staff time. That's 25 hours of inspector time. In LA County, the same restaurant costs \$1,757 and we have restaurants in LA County, and we know how much they cost. So, our restaurant here costs \$3,100 annual fees and the same sized restaurant in LA County on Hollywood Boulevard, costs \$1,700 so we're already twice as much, twice as expensive as LA County. San Diego County, the same sized restaurant, costs \$1,800. \$1,824, so the restaurant here is \$3,100 and in San Diego it's \$1,800. In Maricopa County, the same sized restaurant is \$1,020. Here's it's \$3,100 so you are putting fees on top of us and we are already three times higher than Phoenix. We're two times higher than LA County and we're about two times higher than San Diego County and you are adding more fees to these people.

Larry Rogers: Cara, we are at a deficit right now and whatever LA County chooses to charge or not charge or augment with their tax base, we've been told by the Board of Health that we have to recover the costs of EH through

Cara Evangelista: I get that but

Larry Rogers: except for Vector Control.

Cara Evangelista: But you attempted to use this as a reasoning of why you needed the fee raise the first time on May 7^{th} .

Chris Saxton: Well, the reasoning was the percentage of the raises. When we first came to our Fee Committee, 19% is what we needed. 19% is basically what the cost of inflation has been these ten years so that's what we were showing, the percentage that they were doing their raises over about the same amount of time, not their costs. Different states, the state may put money into subsidize. Just like I worked in Missouri, the state would put money into each of the local health departments to help subsidize those programs. I don't know if California does the same for their food service programs at the local level.

Cara Evangelista: Well, didn't the Board of Health just approve to subsidize part of EH, in Vector?

Larry Rogers: Vector Control

Cara Evangelista: So actually, wasn't your deficit last year about, what was it? \$200,000, \$300,000? And Vector costs what, \$800,000?

Chris Saxton: It doesn't cost that much. Robert Newton, do you have the exact number?

Robert Newton: Vector Control would, for salaries, for staff, cost about \$450,000 and they would be supplemented by grant dollars to the tune of about \$350,000.

Cara Evangelista: So, wasn't that the deficit that you found yourself in last year?

Chris Saxton: Robert, do you know what the deficit was offhand?

Cara Evangelista: Or the 2018. You kept, you used it in the last Fee Committee

Chris Saxton: I thought it was around \$600,000-\$800,000 but hopefully our Finance guys can answer.

Larry Rogers: Didn't we have it in the slide?

Cara Evangelista: I would also like to make one last comment and then I guess I will do the rest in writing or on Friday. The overhead is almost 30%. That's a lot of money. If you were in private industry, a 30% overhead would probably, you would be in trouble. So, I have seen in the past meetings that SN, the Health Department is saying that they follow 2 CFR 200. I would like an explanation of why 2 CFR is being used on top of, on EH because EH, when I read this CFR, that's based on overhead, based on grants, on applying for federal grants. So, why is applying for a federal grant being, why is the CFR for how to calculate overhead for a federal grant being put on EH which is a permit, fee driven, department? And why I would say that is because if you look at when you apply for a federal grant, the federal government doesn't want you to go too high in overhead; however, if I'm applying for a federal grant, the federal government is assuming that I have no building yet. I have no supplies. I have no people yet; I have to hire people. I have to have an IT. So, you're imposing an inflated overhead based on applying for a federal grant onto a permit driven department or can you explain why that is being imposed on you guys because 30%, you can ask any business owner, 30% in overhead, there's no way. On top of that, you're imposing a higher overhead on an inspector who does the same thing and sits in the same desk that's been here ten years, than an inspector that's been here two years so that gap was like \$10,000. So, can you explain why it costs \$10,000 more dollars in overhead to employ an EH II that's been here ten years, than an EH II that's been here two years because that was never explained and that was in a document provided by you guys in those meetings?

Chris Saxton: Well, all I can say for overhead is yeah it's a good question. I know Ernest can answer more to that in Finance that we have a third party go out. It's not us determining what the overhead is for each of the divisions here and I don't know Ernest if you want to elaborate any more on that?

Ernest Blazzard: You are correct in that we are under mandate to calculate an overhead number, which it gets applied and that is done by a third party. We do not calculate that here and

Cara Evangelista: Right, but you control a third party if you are hiring a third party to do

Ernest Blazzard: Whoa, whoa, whoa. Control?

Cara Evangelista: Don't you pay a third party to do this?

Ernest Blazzard: Well, yeah.

Cara Evangelista: That means they are your vendor.

Ernest Blazzard: Yeah, but it would imply that we are manipulating the numbers which is not true at all.

Cara Evangelista: That's not what I'm saying. I'm saying that I have read the CFR that you are using to calculate overhead. It's for federal grants. It's for an application for federal grants so can you explain why it's being imposed on a fee-based department?

Ernest Blazzard: No, it's being applied towards the Health District because we are under mandate to do so under NRS statue. That's why.

Cara Evangelista: To run a CFR, the CFR for fee-based, a fee-based department, to do, to calculate overhead with a CFR that's based on federal grants?

Ernest Blazzard: I don't know the reference to federal grants that you're referring to, so I mean

Cara Evangelista: The name of the CFR is like allocation of federal grant

Ernest Blazzard: Okay.

Karla Shoup: I think what Ernest is saying is that they apply that to the whole District. They don't just carve out Environmental Health and do a special audit for Environmental Health. The audit is performed for the entire District and that's why we use that.

Ernest Blazzard: The reason is because the Environmental Health group uses the same resources, that cost, as the rest of the District does. We use the same legal team. We use the same IT team. We use the same HR team and that's spread out.

Cara Evangelista: I appreciate that; however, the calculation of overhead that you're showing, that it would be, EH would be paying for 13 IT people. Are 13 IT people being funded by EH alone, of 150 people?

Ernest Blazzard: How do you calculate 13?

Cara Evangelista: \$100,000. One employee cost about \$100,000 to employ, you're putting, in one of your presentations. You show that EH is spending \$1.3 million for IT alone.

Ernest Blazzard: Okay, is that just people?

Cara Evangelista: So, what is that? You never said what that number includes.

Ernest Blazzard: Software, hardware, licenses.

Cara Evangelista: You never broke that down. There is no line item for your budget. Your line item budget literally had eight line items. You had eight line items for your approved budget that you presented.

Ernest Blazzard: Okay.

Cara Evangelista: Right here. This was your eighth line item for a budget. You then broke it down in presentations and showed which money was being allocated to which department, but I don't believe that is overhead. What systems are EH using that's \$1.3 million?

Ernest Blazzard: Like I mentioned, we have IT. We have Legal. We have Human Resources.

Cara Evangelista: No, the \$1.3 million is just

Ernest Blazzard: We have building funds.

Cara Evangelista: The \$1.3 million is

Ernest Blazzard: We have other costs that are related to

Cara Evangelista: Right.

Ernest Blazzard: If I may, we have other costs that are related to operating a business, to providing a safe place to work,

Cara Evangelista: Yes.

Ernest Blazzard: To providing the resources where the people can do their job. That's what it is, Cara.

Cara Evangelista: Right, but \$5 million is going just to overhead so \$1.3 million of that is going to IT.

Ernest Blazzard: Ok.

Cara Evangelista: You never said where, what it does. There's no accountability for why you are putting \$1.3 million in a \$20 million-dollar budget to IT.

Ernest Blazzard: In order for the team to do their job, they need to have IT resources. They need to have the ability to connect. They need to have the ability to run analysis. They need to have the ability to communicate, among many, many other things.

Cara Evangelista: Right but where does the \$1., where is the \$1.3 million being used for?

Ernest Blazzard: As I mentioned, there's hardware, there's software licenses

Cara Evangelista: Where's the line item budget of that? How much goes to salary?

Ernest Blazzard: Would that make a difference?

Cara Evangelista: In real business, you have line item, profit loss line item budgets. You do not have eight, an eight page or an eight-line items for a \$20 million-dollar budget.

Ernest Blazzard: I've

Herb Sequera: Cara, what we can do is go ahead and take your comments, look at it, break it down, and then get back to you.

Cara Evangelista: I'm going to also, I'll submit it in writing too.

Herb Sequera: Ok.

Ernest Blazzard: Thank you.

Herb Sequera: And then we'll go ahead

Cara Evangelista: We would like to have answers though. Like in

Herb Sequera: You will have answers, ok.

Cara Evangelista: Before it goes to the

Herb Sequera: Yea, we'll go ahead and get the answers back to you.

Ernest Blazzard: I'll be happy to provide that breakdown.

Cara Evangelista: Ok. Thank you.

Tim Moulson: I'm the kind of guy that looks for solutions, not the causes or the problems and I've got a couple of solutions that just went through my head. Number one is a lot of, what happens in some of the restaurants is managers fire employees. Employees call you guys and do a complaint. You guys come out and investigate the complaint which costs money and the complaints, in my experience, have never been valid. Is there a way to recoup that cost off the person that filed the complaint number one? Number two, if you need money, get ahold of the marijuana people. They've got lots of it.

Chris Saxton: Well, the state has the marijuana people wrapped up at the moment so that'll be a tough one.

Tim Moulson: Good for (inaudible) because I know a good lawyer.

Victoria Harding: I am the Chief Steward for the SEIU union here and I work over in the Epidemiology area. There is something here that concerns me as a person who works in Epidemiology. That is that you now have a new fee for Norovirus investigations, Legionella investigations, and Epi/Other investigations of \$143 that I am assuming is going to be absorbed by that facility that I let you guys know that there might be an issue with, and somebody could have gotten something there. Then you all are going to send somebody out and now you're going to charge a fee for public health investigation. Am I now supposed to look at my cases and figure out do I really believe that this is here because sometimes I don't really think that it's there? I just get everyplace somebody has been and I send them over to you and so you are going to have people being charged money for exposures that didn't even happen in those institutions. I think this is horrific! It stops our ability of sending things over and having Environmental Health go out under investigation for actual real-life infections.

Chris Saxton: And I believe it's not here's this one complaint here, go look at that and we're going to charge the fee. What it is more, is that if we go out there, we see that there's a large outbreak that's going to take a lot of staff time to go contain. You know we've had casinos that had 300 plus people getting ill and that did take a lot of staff time. There has to be some kind of cost recovery for that. Now are we going to go, oh somebody may have gotten sick here. We went out there, no, nobody got sick, you owe \$143. No.

Victoria Harding: So, are you actually going to go out when I say two people are sick, three people are sick, 20 people are sick, oh there might be 100 people sick here? How are you going to determine who gets that fee?

Chris Saxton: I think it, we'd have to look at, is there a lot of evidence that this illness was here? Is this going to take a lot more staff time than just one simple visit to go out there and say everything's looking good, they still got an A. Or wow, there's lots of problems out here; yeah, there could have been somebody getting sick. If we're going to have to have inspectors coming back, this place is going to need a lot of work, then yes.

Victoria Harding: And I'd like to know how you all, who are not doing the Epi investigation on that, can figure that one out. Thank you.

Chris Saxton: Alright. Anyone else wishing to make a comment?

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS

Chris Saxton, Environmental Health Director, opened the workshop at 9:02 a.m. by welcoming all those in attendance. The purpose of the workshop is to collect public opinion on the proposed Fee Schedule changes, especially whether the proposed changes will:

- 1. Impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a business; or
- 2. Directly restrict the formation, operations, or expansion of a business.

This information will be presented at a public hearing at the Board of Health meeting on Thursday, September 26, 2019, at this same location.

The following SNHD staff introduced themselves: Larry Rogers, Food Operations Manager; Herb Sequera, Solid Waste and Compliance Manager; Karla Shoup, Consumer Health Programs Manager; Robert Newton, Environmental Health Analyst; Ernest Blazzard, Financial Services Manager; and Healther Hanoff, Environmental Health Secretary.

Mr. Saxton instructed anyone wishing to ask questions or make comments, to use the microphone to clearly state their name and comments and to spell their last name for the record. Comments not made into the microphone, may not be audible and may not be included in the public record. Comments were limited to five (5) minutes. The first public comment period was for anyone wishing to comment on agenda items. The second public comment period was for anyone wishing to comment on any topics.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Dave Dazlich: I'm the Director of Government Affairs for the Las Vegas Metro Chamber of Commerce. I'm here this morning representing Las Vegas Metro Chamber of Commerce, the largest and broadest based business association here in Southern Nevada. Our concern relating to these fees is on the Business Impact Statement process. This is a subject that our two organizations have corresponded on in the past, especially in regard to NRS 237.080, which lays forth the requirements for the Business Impact Statement process. We have no record of ever having received the Business Impact Statement. We were notified of this meeting through third party partners and we are concerned that we have not had time to push this out to our membership and solicit actual comment germane to the fees so we're here today requesting an additional four weeks of time to push this out to our membership and get comment that can be relevant to these fees as considered. We noticed on the Business Impact Statement, dated July 18th, that the first hearing after that was August 15th, so we're simply asking that our membership be given that same amount of time to prepare comment on the impact of these potential fees. Thank you.

Chris Saxton: Ok and just with that, the plan is to take this to the Board of Health and present the Business Impact Statement there. Then it wouldn't be until the next Board of Health until actually it would be up for a vote for any decisions. But of course, we can take your question and take it back to leadership and get you an answer on what we can do.

Dave Dazlich: Thank you.

Bryan Wachter: Good morning. I'm the Vice President of the Retail Association of Nevada. We'd like to echo the comments of the Chamber of Commerce. We want to be able to provide the most up-to-date and effective information so that when you present that Business Impact Statement to the Board, that information can be relevant, up-to-date, and full so we would request, respectfully, the ability to kind of reopen this. Maybe schedule another workshop those four weeks

out so we can get you the information so that the information you have for the Board is the exact information you need. So, we would request that as well. Thank you.

Chris Saxton: Alright. Thank you.

PRESENTATION (ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH FEE SCHEDULE CHANGES)

Chris Saxton presented the PowerPoint presentation for the proposed Environmental Health Fee Schedule changes. The Health District has not had a fee increase in ten (10) years so Environmental Health is no longer financially self-sufficient. The Board of Health direction is that Environmental Health should pay for itself. The community continues to grow and so are work demands. The Health District is looking for suggestions and comments regarding cost recovery. He encouraged attendees to give staff their solutions for cost recovery.

The Fee Committee and Board of Health members wanted people using services to pay for the services. One suggestion was to charge for some B Downgrades and increase C Downgrades and Closure fees. This includes a punitive amount. For consolidated grade cards, those that already have it, won't be paying the fee but there would be a \$715 fee for any new ones requested. A Disease Investigation fee will be charged if there is an outbreak at a facility. If the Health District investigates and everything looks great, you will not be charged. If there are lots of problems and the Health District will have to spend additional staff time to make sure everything is corrected, then the fee will be charged.

In the past, Environmental Health paid for itself. Now, the Board of Health wants staff to determine revenue and expenses by each program and adjust fees accordingly. Staff will be looking at this data next year and will have additional workshops at that time.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS PERIOD

Cara Evangelista: I'm from Impact. I made public comment on Wednesday. I would just like to state again, for people that weren't here on Wednesday, that this really isn't a public workshop. You just did a fifteen-minute presentation that didn't really have any information and you're asking for a really big fee raise. We will be putting all of our comments with the information provided at the EH Fee Committee meetings, based on what you gave us, and we're going to ask our questions off of that but I'm not really sure that this meets the definition of a public workshop. There was just like no information. I would like to say again that the B grades are being calculated using the first inspection. The first inspection, which is covered by annual permit fees, which I don't think that's right. I would also wonder is the \$1.7 million dollars that you are in a deficit in 2019, is that including the Vector money that was just approved by the Board of Health or is that not including that?

Herb Sequera: No, it doesn't include

Larry Rogers: The \$1.7 million? I think it did. Robert?

Robert Newton: It includes the debt. What the Board of Health directed us to do was to include 8010 money, tax dollar money, to support Vector Control beginning in FY21.

Cara Evangelista: Ok. And then what about, so those are the estimates and when do the actuals come in because aren't you collecting fees right now?

Ernest Blazzard: We're in the middle of our year end audit and we don't expect results for another several weeks.

Cara Evangelista: And is that going to be presented before the vote to approve fees?

Ernest Blazzard: I'm not exactly sure of the timing but we plan to present that to the Finance Committee of the Board in October and then get their approval on it in November.

Cara Evangelista: So, if you're getting the fees approved in October, you don't actually know what the actuals are?

Ernest Blazzard: Well, again I'm not sure exactly what the timing is going to be when we have the actuals.

Cara Evangelista: Thank you.

Chris Saxton: Ok. Thanks for your comment.

Joe Djavairian: Hi, everyone. I'm the CEO of Angelina's Pizzerias. Basically, just my thought, you know, when I looked over it through the email that I got the other day. You know we are a family owned and operated business. We've been in the Valley for over 13 years, you know, and Chris when you mentioned that when we are talking about the B Downgrades and stuff like that, you know you mentioned that we want to get everyone to do better, right? So my thought process on that is simply like you know if we are really pushing people to do better than are we really going to makeup that amount in the fees because like what you just showed with the actual and then the proposed, that's assuming that as many people get downgraded in the future as they do now so I don't think it's going to have quite the impact that it would from a financial standpoint that we proposed here. But what I, personally myself, this is my own opinion, I'm not talking on behalf of everybody. Obviously, some people might have a different thought about this but me myself personally, I would actually rather see an increase in my annual permit fee to makeup some of those costs than to see the downgrade fees go up so drastically because in the end of the day, if I believe as the business owner that a health inspector is coming in with an agenda that they need to makeup this money, I believe that they will be a little bit more hyper critical than they would be necessarily and because they're trying to look to makeup some money and so that's going to change the realm of the inspection I think. And we obviously, I've known Larry for years and he knows, we go beyond our biggest efforts to try to make sure that we don't have any downgrades but I don't want to see a situation take place where the health inspector is being somehow enticed to give us a fee because they're trying to makeup for some of that lost money. So, me personally,

I would rather see an increase in the annual permit fees. I have four locations in the Valley. I don't mind that because you know there are fluke instances and quite frankly, in this business, the type of business that we're in, you know having that one increase annually is something that you know it's a financial burden that we'll sustain but the lasting effects of a downgrade for instance, from the public image standpoint to a revenue going forward standpoint, I think is much more detrimental than it would be from an annual permit fee raise, personally. Those are just my thoughts. You know, I'm not sure if we'll have another chance to give the opinion but you know I just got the email the other day. I was out of the country and I just thought I'd come down. When I saw that, I just thought that that would be a valid point that I'd want to submit to you guys so thank you.

Chris Saxton: Yeah, I think that's an excellent point. Thanks.
